The Trans Group is back!



Finally...last week we announced the return of the transgender and non-binary support group (details later in the newsletter). Although we won't ever replace Rae Antczak as our facilitator, we continue to find new leaders ready to bring much-needed support. The more we learn about the transgender youth

experience, the more we need to provide support at home, in schools, and in the community. <u>American Association of Pediatrics article</u>

If you are transgender or non-binary, you know how important support is. If your gender identity/gender expression is outside societal norms, you know how critical to your well-being and mental health that circle of kindness is.

Support comes in many flavors: support groups, families that embrace new pronouns and name changes, allies that stand up for you at the workplace, finding a counselor who truly understands gender, friends that listen, and encouraging those who don't understand to seek education to be supportive of you.

Generation Z has the vocabulary to describe exactly who they are and that clarity threatens and confuses many older generations who haven't grown up swiping an iPad or learning their classmate is trans. For the most part, they understand and accept the LGBTQ+ experience. Youth today are a new kind of trailblazer, the gender generation. They follow other pioneers - like those who dared to be themselves in the roaring '20s, or those who fought the police raids at gay bars in the '50s, and the feminists of the '70s and those who fought for their lives against HIV/AIDS in the '80s/'90s and those who used the courts to get our right to marry in 2015.

That said, the history of transgender and non-binary people as leaders in our community is not commonly known. They have been around as early as 5000 BC, often holding prestigious religious or spiritual positions. As a starting point of this history, read the <u>Seven things about transgender people that you didn't know</u> from the Human Rights Commission (HRC) website.

Imagine... we may be just a few generations away from a time when your gender identity/expression and your sexual orientation, are just a part of who you are and it's no big deal.


Kenosha Pride 2021


