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A MESSAGE FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR What's happening?



By now you have likely heard the horrifying stories of the anti-LGBTQ directive enacted last week by Texas Governor, Greg Abbott. The bill would penalize parents who support their transgender and non-binary youth and could classify those parents as committing "child abuse." This bill is shocking and is being looked at by other states to see if it passes. Read more on Texas.

Texas is not alone. Almost half of the states across the country have had active bills in committees since January 2022 affecting LGBTQIA+ rights. Follow this ACLU site for weekly updates on National LGBTQ Bills. These bills continue to polarize our country instead of uniting and protecting us.

The good news for Wisconsin is our State Senate is now on recess and it is unlikely (although not impossible) that our "Don't Say Gay" bill <u>AB-562</u> or the Parents Right's Bill <u>AB-963</u> will come to a vote for now.

On the global front, images of the invasion of the Ukraine are heartbreaking as we watch a country be destroyed. As many flee the bombing to neighboring countries, refugees and especially LGBTQIA+ refugees can have additional safety concerns. Some countries like Poland and Hungary have anti-gay laws that could be extreme. Imagine a transgender person with a passport name and gender marker that doesn't align with how they present at the border and you can see why these rights are so important. More on this. We have included a link to international agencies that are trying to help.

So, what can we do? We can unite and work on each issue as it comes up whether it is a city ordinance, supporting a victim of hate crimes, or bringing awareness to an international crisis. In this newsletter, we are announcing our first community coordinated advocacy effort called **RAISE!** (keep reading below...) We hope you join us.


March's Read: Punch Me Up to the Gods by Brian Broome

A poetic and raw coming-of-age memoir in essays about blackness, masculinity, and addiction, Punch Me Up to the Gods: A Memoir introduces a powerful new talent in Brian Broome, whose early years growing up in Ohio as a dark-skinned Black boy harboring crushes on other boys propel forward this gorgeous, aching, and unforgettable debut. Brian's recounting of his experiences—in all their cringe-worthy, hilarious, and

heartbreaking glory—reveal a perpetual outsider awkwardly squirming to find his way in. Indiscriminate sex and escalating drug use help to soothe his hurt, young psyche, usually to uproarious and devastating effect. A no-nonsense mother and broken father play crucial roles in our misfit's origin story. But it is Brian's voice in the retelling that shows the true depth of vulnerability for young Black boys that is often quietly near to bursting at the seams.

Cleverly framed around Gwendolyn Brooks's poem "We Real Cool," the iconic and loving ode to Black boyhood, Punch Me Up to the Gods is at once playful, poignant, and wholly original. Broome's writing brims with swagger and sensitivity, bringing an exquisite and fresh voice to ongoing cultural conversations about Blackness in America. *Kirkus Reviews*


